"Mr. Roberts" In Possible Premiere At Benny Decker

Theater arrangements for the KEARSARGE production of "Mr. Roberts" have been nearly completed. The first performance is scheduled to be presented for the ship's company and air group on 26 December.

Defense Department Studying Military Cut

Washington (AFPS). The Defense Department is currently studying a substantial cut in the number of Military personnel in support of the Army, Navy, Air Force, and Marine Corps combat units which would not impar the fighting efficiency of the combat forces.

This was disclosed by Dr. John A. Hannah, Assistant Secretary of Defense for Manpower and Personnel, in Washington, at a recent press conference.

"The Air Force has already made great progress in reducing the number of support troops," Dr. Hannah said. "The Air Force is confident that by the end of fiscal 1955 it will be able to man 127 wings with 970,000 men."

Dr. Hannah also has asked the Army to get along in fiscal year 1955 with 1,281,000 men; the Navy with 670,000 men, and the Marine Corps with 207,000. He

For the second time during our Far Eastern Tour the Kearsarge is playing host to "Movie-Land." Kearsarge Restaurant **Features**

Ever try cooking for 2,600 people?

That is the million dollar-a year job of the Commissary Dept. headed by LTJG. R.B. Mulvany.

No effort is spared to assure that the crew's meals are as nutritious, attractive and tasty as possible.

The quantity of food that may be served is controlled by the Navy Ration Law. Under the law this ship's mess operates on a food allowance system that assures serving each man a balanced diet regardless of any price fluctuation in the provisions supplied the ship.

Kearsarge Carries 700 Tons

The most important limiting factor on the variety and quality of food served, especially in the forward area is the availability of provisions. While the KEARSARGE can carry over 700 tons of provisions and feed well while operating independently for over 80 days (approximately 624,000 meals) the more perishable items are soon used and must be replenished regularly from the supply ships in the

Many fresh fruits and vege-tables will not stand shipment from the states to the forward area-those perishables which do reach us on replenishment days are often quite "tired" from their travels. Fortunately some items such as oranges, apples and mellons keep quite well and for this reason you will usually find them at breakfast or in your night rations.

Periods in Hawaii, Yokosuka and Manila have provided opportunities to procure many excellent local fresh foods which will last several days after leaving the area. You can be sure that fresh provisions are ordered when available in as large quantities as can be used before spoilage.

In charge of the ordering and stowage of all provisions is E. V. Ackley, CSl, who with his assistant E. J. Scribner, CS2, handles very large stocks of frozen and dry provisions in addition to the many fresh items carried.

To prepare three meals a day plus night rations, midnight chow and early chow is a 24 hour job requiring a staff of 68 cooks and bakers. The cooks and bakers begin their day at 4 A.M. and work until after supper is served.

It is a continual seven day a week job - its satisfaction comes from the cook's and baker's pride in their work and their knowing that the crew appreciates a good General Mess.

Armed Forces Making Plans To Kindle All Young Hearts

(By Armed Forces Press Service) Christmas is for kids.

It's a funny thing about people in Service. They've all got a soft spot when it comes to kids. Maybe it's because they don't have very much contact with children. Maybe it's because they've seen too much-too many blasted towns, too many orphans

of battle.

Whatever it is, universal soft-heartedness about kids comes out real strong around Christmas.

American men and women stationed all over the world, many of them separated from their famof them separated from their families and loved ones, always seem to find a way to make Christmas a happy time for the children— wherever they may be.

S/Sgt. Robert L. Ziegner, USAF, wrote to an American newspaper the other day. He was spokesman for a group of his buddies with the 3rd Food Service Sq. in Korea. They've adopted 80 war orphans—none of them over five years old. The airmen found the kids huddled in a cave trying to keep warm.

The sergeant didn't write to get

a pat on the back. He was asking for clothes and blankets. The airmen managed to build a couple of houses for the children and sup-ply them with food. They just needed a little extra help.

Around Inchon, Korea, about 100 sailors stationed there with the Naval Fleet Activities unit wanted to help the war orphans who crowd that port city. They couldn't help them all, of course,

so they selected 15 who happened to be cripples.

The Navy men are keeping the kids fed from their galley, clothing them, and making sure that their educations are started.

There's only one thing that There's only one thing that bothers the sailors. They'll have to ship out someday and they don't know who'll take care of the kids then.

The whole 45th Inf. Div. is gathering its forces to help the Korean war orphans. The Thunderbirds, who have seen a lot of war's misery over there, are writing to their families and friends for clothing and gifts for the homeless children.

The battle-hardened division

will hold Christmas parties for the kids, distribute gifts, and have plenty of American food to feed

That's just a small part of what

There will be parties for children in Europe, Great Britain, all over the Pacific, in the States — wherever there are American servicemen. Some of the parties and shows will be big, some small. But the service people will be doing all they





Frank Knox Quintet Trounced 69-36 Kearsarge Cagers Win Fifth Tilt At Sea By John Laudermilch

The basketball team from the destroyer Frank Knox proved no match for a more experienced Kearsarge quintet on Sunday afternoon as the Kearsarge combined speed and superior height to win their fifth game of the season by a score of 69-36.

With Tom Overton and Bob Goold leading the way in the first quarter the Kearsarge racked up 12 points before the Knox broke into the scoring column. Tony Yoli then found the range for the Knox with 6 straight points, but he could find no appreciable help from any of his mates and the Kearsarge began to pull away as the game moved on.

After scoring only 25 points the entire first half, the Kear-sarge team settled down to push 24 counters through the hoop in the third quarter alone. From that point on the issue was never in doubt. The Knox, game to the end, displayed a fine group of ball handlers, but their lack of height and subsequent tiring late in the game worked against their hopes of a surprise vic-

Again a slippery court, just as in the game last week with the Oriskany, caused many a tum-ble and spill, and was in part cause for the rather sloppy play of both ball clubs. Yoli, who was high point man for his team with 12, was forced out of the contest late in the fourth quarter with a leg cramp, but by then it was too late to matter.

The Knox boys suffered their second loss in seven ball games. They previously had beaten the Formosa College team, and were recognized as champions of the destroyer fleet here in Task Force 77 following their vic-Force 77 following their tory over the Isbell during the team's last stay in port. But Sunday was a different story.

Like Hunting? Japan Offers **Possibilities**

The response was terrific to the article printed last week on hunting in Japan. Following is the procedure, and added in-formation for taking a hunting trip around Tokyo.

1. First, a hunting nermit must be obtained from The Provost Marshall in the Administration Building on the Naval Base at Yokosuka.

2. Application form for Japanese hunting license will be submitted in duplicate to the Governor of the Prefecture. Information can be obtained on such from local police stations and the Kearsaga Office.

3. Guns and ammunition should be obtained from the local hunting offices where you apply for an English speaking guide.

4. The areas to be hunted all have a local office that you must get in touch with prior to hunting. The local office must be notified some days in advance in time to return information if overnight lodgings are required.

5. Hunting in the different local, specified, areas is under strict control. Only a certain number of hunters are registered to enter a specific area at one time.

6. Information concerning the different local hunting area addresses, game that can be hunted there, and their distance from Tokyo may be obtained from the Kearsaga Office on a prepared information sheet.

7. To get the most out of a day of hunting it is suggested that anyone planning to hunt in the Tokyo area should make all arrangements for permit, license, guide and guns, and also contact areas local office prior to the day for which the hunting trip is planned.

It is noted that some R. & R. hotels make available to the ship offer hunting as one of the means of recreation available. Also, information received from VR-23 indicate that there is a lot of red tape involved before anyone can go hunting.

Movies Cost Over Half Of Recreation Funds

How much dose it cost the Navy to provide us with the movies we have in Hangar Bay One almost every night?

Free distrubution of the best motion pictures to ships and overseas bases accounted for over half of the total recreation funds expended in 1953 from BuPers Central Recreation Fund. Fleet movies required an outlay of \$2,600,000 from the total of \$4,263,000 provided by the fund various special services

Kearsarge Restaurant

A. L. Campbell, Chief Commissaryman is the general mess supervisor and R. L. Dewey, CSI is the Division Leading Petty Officer. Campbell is respons-able for the preparation of the weekly bill of fare submitted to the Commanding Officer for approval and also supervises the preparation and serving of all meals. He must work up a menu within the allowed food ration which will have variety, eye appeal, nourishment and still have sufficient leeway for such extras as private coffee messes (\$750 per week), midnight chow for night check crews and night rations (\$1000 per week). He is aided by an accurate daily control record maintained by K. L. Ragsdale, SKSN.

It should be pointed out that while no allowance is given in the Navy Ration Law for midnight chow, night rations or private coffee messes, they are provided nouri shment. for their helpful and beneficial effect upon the

morale of the crew.

Those fried ham and develed egg sandwiches that are served as a night ration must come from the food allowed for the day meals, thus the mess must be carefully managed to provide three good meals a day plus these desirable "extras".

Some idea of the size of the

Commissary Department's task can be seen in the work of the Bake Shop. Three shifts are operated around the clock to provide the bread and pastries consumed by the crew. Each day the Bake Shop runs off 735 loaves of bread. To serve pie for one meal 500 pies are baked - pie is usually served six times a week, this adds up to 3000 pies.

The Cormissary equipment the KEARSARGE is generaly adequate to serve nearly any menu desired, however one exception is the ice cream plant. To serve one meal requires 145 gallons of ice cream. The capacity of the hardening boxes in the Commissary Department is insufficient as it takes ice cream about 24 hours to harden after freezing the general mess is limited one serving of ice cream every other day because of this.

The KEARSARGE has been able to serve ice cream in the general mess more often than most other ships by utilizing one soda fountain to make ice cream for the mess instead of for sale in the Soda Fountains. The lights burn late in the ship's store ice cream plant forward and the Commissary Department ice cream plant aft to keep up with the demand.

Nutritious, tasty and varied meals are not all that go to make for "good eating". Several inovations have been made by CDR F. G. WINIECKI to improve atmosphere of the mess decks. Perhaps the biggest improvement was the relocation of mess tray dumpsters and garbage cans from the mess halls to the scullary removing an unplesant sight, noise and smell from the mess deck and speeding the washing of mess gear in the scullary.

The Master At Arms and mess cooks work from early morning until evening each day to assure that your mess decks are clean and attractive. You can help by your effort to keep the decks

Its a big interesting job, one that your Commissary Department prides itself on doing well.

Task Force 77 had two CVA-34's last week. The unique occurance came when the USS ORISKANY (CVA-34), on which the forthcoming Paramount production "Bridges at Toko-Rd" was being filmed, developed a catapult difficulty and the entire Paramount Production Staff was forced to continue their operations on board the KEARSARGE.

The change involved a switch in numbers for the Kearsarge. old thirty-three on the flight deck was blacked out and a thirty four was painted over it.
