2000 REUNION, NEWPORT, RHODE ISLAND

The date for the 2000 reunion has been set! It will take place starting Sunday, October 1st and ending Thursday, October 5. Our headquarters will be at The Mainstay Inn (Best Western), 151 Admiral Kalbfus Rd., Newport, R.I.02840. The phone number is 401-849-9880 and the Fax number is 401-849-4391. Our room rates are \$68.00, plus 12% taxes, (this includes a continental breakfast). If you wish to arrive before the 1st or stay past the 6th the room rates are \$129.00 plus taxes. Rooms can now be reserved, and seeing how there is a limited numbers of rooms, it's best to make your reservation early! Be sure to say you are with the USS Kearsarge Reunion, to get the discounted rates. Judy O'Connell is our rep at the hotel and it is best to make your reservations with her if possible.

Some of the desk help have said the reunion is sold out but this is not the case.

Ted Eddington, Charlie Shaw, and their wives, have worked up a great tour package, which should prove to provide a wonderful experience for all who attend the reunion. This time of year, the New England area is very scenic and with any luck at all the leaf "peeping" should be spectacular.

All information on the tours is subject to change. Be sure to check your information packet when you sign in at the reunion for the latest changes such as departure times. We will also have changes listed at the Hospitality Room. Don't be the one waiting for a bus that has already left.

Sunday evening at 6:00pm we will have a welcome buffet at the hotel and get settled in. Dress in your nautical attire and enjoy Breast of Chicken, Pasta, Vegetables, Carrot cake, coffee and tea. The price for this will be \$15.00 per person.

Monday will be a tour of Newport, the Harbor, and 10 miles of the scenic coastline, including a tour of one of the local Mansions "Marble House". This is a very scenic trip that you won't want to miss. We will be in two groups with one group starting with the Harbor tour and the other starting with the Mansions. There will be time to shop and eat lunch on your own at Old Newport. This tour will end at around 2:00 PM and will cost \$30.00 per person.

Tuesday will be the "Old Fashioned Clambake" that Ted assures us will be one that you will not soon forget. The menu will include Steamers, Mussels with Butter, New England Lobster in the one pound to one and a quarter size, Barbecue Chicken, Sausage, Fresh Fish, Potatoes, Corn on the Cob, Onions, Cole Slaw, Brown Bread and a Seasonal Fruit Platter. A 12oz New York Steak can be ordered instead of the Lobster if desired. We will try to get the Lady Kays to come up

with some games or other fun things to make this a great day. This outing will leave at 2:00 PM and end at 6:00 PM with a cost of \$35.00 per person

Wednesday we will be going to the ship museum, Battleship Cove, in Fall River, Massachusetts, where we will tour the Battleship Massachusetts and have lunch aboard her. There is also a destroyer, submarine, and PT Boat to tour. We will also stop at one of the Mall outlet stores on the way back to Newport. The price is \$35.00 per person and includes lunch.

Thursday

Tour one will be a trip to Mystic Seaport, CT and will leave the hotel at 9:00 AM and tour the whaling port of Mystic. Lunch will be on your own at Mystic. This trip will return at 3:00 PM, to give you time to get ready for the Dinner Dance. The cost is \$30.00 per person

Tour two will be a trip to Foxwoods Casino at Ledyard, CT. Lunch will be on your own and Ted promises he is working on a few free perks for those on this tour. The cost of this tour is \$20.00 per person and will leave the hotel at 9:00 AM and return at 3:00 PM.

Our Dinner Dance will be at the Officers Club in Newport and will start with Cocktail Hour from 6:00 PM until 7:00. Our evening will include a memorial service, welcome talk, great food and a six piece band for your dancing pleasure. The reunion and evening will come to an end at 10.00PM. The price of the dinner dance is \$30.00 and includes transportation to and from the Officers Club. Since this will take place at the Naval Station, this will be a dress up affair.

The Lady Kays will be holding a raffle so don't forget for this event, to bring something with you.

If you are interested in golfing bring your clubs as Chief Don Donnley will try to arrange a golf outing for you. If you know of any good courses contact the Chief at 407-847-5928.

The nearest airport is the T.F. Green Airport in Providence, RI and shuttle service is available for about \$15.00 a person. Motor home parking for 10 motor homes that are self-contained will be available at the hotel. There will be a \$5.00 a person charge that will cover the continental breakfast. For those wishing to stay at a motor home park, Melville Ponds is located about 6 miles from the hotel.

MEMORIES

On November 1951, as a nineteen year old, I was assigned to the USS Kearsarge located at Bremerton Washington. I was a third class aviation ordnanceman who's duties included: Loading ordnance into ammo lockers from replenishment ships, belting 20mm ammunition,

installing the fins on 500 pound bombs and 5 inch rockets, and making napalm using Japanese's Zeros belly tanks. Most of the time while operating off Korea we worked 12 hours on and 12 hours off. The main mission of our planes was to provide close air support and we had prop planes and jets to accomplish this. I remember one time when one of the jet's bomb racks had been damaged and as the plane approached to land a piece of the bomb rack broke off and almost hit the landing officer who was located at the end of the flight deck directing the planes approach. His comment about the experience was described as "Only God and the laundryman knew how scared I was".

Another exciting moment during my tour of duty was when our jet pilots had a dogfight with some North Koreans Migs over our task force. The planes were mere specs in the sky but the captain of the ship put the pilot's radio output on the loud speakers of the ship. Needless to say it was exciting listening to it and filled with a lot of descriptive colorful expressions about the North Koreans.

I guess the most vivid memories I had was how damn cold it was during the winter months, ambient temperatures were well below zero with a wind chill factor of even lower. On the flight deck you had to wear a facemask to keep from getting frost bitten, however the mask would freeze to your lips. When you went inside you had to rub your lips before you could take the mask off.

It's hard to believe that it has been almost 50 years since my Korean War experience.
