Dear John,

Reading the most recent Kearsaga, I have an answer to one item mentioned and a question about another. The Kearsarge CV 33 was built at the New York Shipyard in Brooklyn, commissioned 2 March 1946. I know this because I bought an old brass ashtray on E Bay that had the years the three (up to that point) Kearsarges were commissioned and also the date of the commissioning of CV 33 and where it was built.

The other item is regarding a comment in the dedication statement by Captain C. W. Cook. He said, in his statement that the Kearsarge CVS 33, had just made it's third cruise to the Far East. Was he talking about CVS 33 or the History of the Kearsarge as CV 33, CVA 33 and CVS 33? I came on board the Kearsarge CVA 33, in April 1953, she had already made one cruise to Korea when I came on board, we were sailing from Pearl to Korea when the armistice began. We made an additional cruise, to Korea after coming out of dry-dock in San Francisco.

So I was on board during the second and third cruises to the Far East, getting off in October 1955. I don't know if the Kearsarge was designated CVA after the first Korean tour or before. However, if he was not talking about CVS 33 he should have studied his ship's history a little more thoroughly. Sincerely,

You recall that our PCO and CO was Captain Francis J.McKenna. In all the time I served in KEARSARGE I never knew that McKenna had previously been the CO of ST. LO (CVE-63) when she was lost in the Battle of Leyte Gulf in 1944.

#### USS ST LO (CVE 63) CAPT Francis J. McKenna, USN, Commanding Officer

Prior to entering the protective rain squall, ST LO also came under intense gunfire from the battleships. Upon exiting the rain squall on the task unit's run to the south, she was nearest the Japanese until a new course change placed her on the unengaged starboard side, furthest from the enemy heavy cruisers and battleships. Her new position within the task unit enabled her to survive the surface action with relatively little damage. However, about ninety minutes after the surface action had concluded, Taffy III was set upon by kamikaze aircraft. ST LO was chosen as a primary target and a bomb-lain "Zeke 52" suicide plane crashed through her flight deck with catastrophic results. Powerful internal explosions followed and about 30 minutes later, ST LO sank into the Philippine Trench, the second CVE of Taffy III to be lost that day.

RADM McKenna passed away in 1969

Our Historian, Dan Levin, has proposed excerpting installments from Alderic O. "Dick" Violette's publication, with a different KEARSARGE featured each issue. Here is the first!

SHIPS NAMED "KEARSARGE" AND THE MOUNTAIN FOR WHICH THEY WERE NAMED.

The Sloop of War, KEARSARGE.

The first KEARSARGE was launched on 11 September 1861 by the Portsmouth Navy Yard, Portsmouth, NH; sponsored by Mrs. Henry McFartand, wife of the editor of the Concord Statesmen; and commissioned 24 January 1862, Captain Charles W. Pickering in command.

The Sloop of War KEARSARGE departed Portsmouth 5 February 1862 for the coast of Spain to join in the blockade of Confederate raiders. Captain John A. Winslow, took command of the KEARSARGE on April 8, 1863, while she remained in European waters searching for raiders. Arriving in Cherbourg, France on 14 June 1864, she found the Confederate Ship ALABAMA in port. On June 19, ALABAMA stood out of Cherbourg Harbor for her last action. Careful of French neutrality, KEARSARGE'S new commanding officer, Captain Winslow, took the sloop of war well clear of territorial waters, then turned to meet the Confederate cruiser. ALABAMA fired first but the battle quickly turned against her and within an hour the ALABAMA had been reduced to a sinking wreck and her Captain Raphael Semmes struck his colors and surrendered.

KEARSARGE rescued the majority of the ALABAMA'S survivors; but Captain Semmes and 41 others were picked up by a British yacht. Captain Winslow was promoted to Commodore and the New York Chamber of Commerce honored him, the KEARSARGE, and her crew, mainly men from New Hampshire, for their victory. The KEARSARGE returned to sea and the coast of Spain in April 1865 in search of Confederate ships. After

cruising the Mediterranean and the English Channel south to Liberia, the KEARSARGE returned to the Boston Navy Yard in August 1866.

In January 1868 KEARSARGE sailed to serve in the South Pacific and along the coast of South America to protect American interests for the next four years. She later performed similar duties in the Asiatic waters of Japan, China and the Philippines. During this time she carried Professor Hall's scientific party from Nagasaki, Japan, to Vladivostok, Russia, to observe the transit of Venus.

The last assignment for the KEARSARGE was protecting American interests in the West Indies, off Venezuela and along the Central Americas. On February 2, 1894, on Roncador Reef off the coast of Nicaragua, the KEARSARGE was wrecked. Having attained the rank of Rear Admiral, Winslow's years of service continued long after the famous sea battle. He died in Boston on September 29,1873.
