Early Separation Available To 'Kiddie Cruisers'

BuPers Notice 1910 dated 13 August 1953 provides certain procedures for seperation from the Naval Service of enlisted personnel now serving in a min-

ority enlistment.
The following instructions are only applicable to those REGULAR Navy enlistees now serving on minority enlistment entered into before 20 June 1951.

(a) Personnel will be retained on active duty until completion

of three full years service.

(b) Personnel eligible for early release under various early release programs with less than three full years service will have to request in writing that such release be effected. Under these circumstances a five year Naval Reserve obligation is incurred.

(c) Personnel who will have served a three full years by seperation date will be seperated in normal fashion.

## On The Bookshelf

One of the many new books in the library is THE SINGER NOT THE SONG by Audrey Erskine Lindop. Over and over, Father Keo-ugh tolled the Church bell, and the sound, loud and clear on the morning air, had a sharp effect on the town. It woke Sam, the American bartender, and woke the bank manager, the dentist and Chief of Police. It brought old Uncle Joaquin dreams of the untroubled days when he had been altar boy; it reminded Mother Montezera that she must ingratiate herself with the new pastor, without alienating Malo; and it roused the child Locha's nursemaid, Josefa, who called out, "This marks a new time for Quantana."

The small isolated Mexican community was completely dominated by the bandit, Malo, the Bad-One-of-the Cats. Nobody challenged his word or authority; the police were powerless and the church was powerless. He had ruthlessly crippled the people's faith. Nobody matched him in stature or in courage until Father Keough came, and from the moment of their first meeting, Malo knew that he had an opponent of true worth in the dark-haired Irish priest.


Around these two unforgetable figures, the author weaves a story of great warmth and deep feeling. The fact that they grow to like and respect one another in the courses their confine in the course of their conflict adds considerably to its tension

and excitement.
No crime is too deadly for Malo in the campaign against Father Keough. He orders him killed; and failing in that, he tries to shame him before the community. Sometimes the people community. Sometimes are possible follow the priest, sometimes they follow Malo, but more and more they are drawn to Father Keough for his faith and his understanding and resourceful ness--and even Malo is drawn to him. But he has been corrupt so long that he cannot easily believe in goodness, and finally it is Locha, grown to womanhood who provides the bandit with a we apon for his most evil trial. Seldom in fiction will you find two such adversaries-one stending for all that is most

standing for all that is good, the other representing all that is evil--perfectly matched, both equally exciting and appealing. In this fine, sensitive and altogether heartening new novel, Audrey Erskine Lindop has realized all the promise of her writing career.



# **Navy Will Build** 165 Ships, Alter 2 in '54 Program

Washington (AFPS) - Announcing the Navy's fiscal 1954 ship construction and conversion program, Secretary of the Navy Robert B. Anderson said recently that a third attack aircraft carrier of the Forrestal class, 14 other ships, and 150 land-ing craft will be built in private shipyards.
The three carriers of the For-

restal class have been redesigned to incorporate the new angled flight deck and other improvements—a move expected to cut construction costs of the USS Forrestal alone by \$3,000,000 without delaying its completion date.

All qualified private yards have been invited to bid on the 1954 work which will include the building of three destroyers, two escort vessels, four 165-foot minesweepers, one mine hunter, two ammunition ships and two landing ships.

The assignment of a new attack submarine and an attack cargo ship will be announced at a later

date, the Secretary stated.

The new carrier contract will be awarded to a qualified East Coast shipyard since no private yard on the Pacific Coast has the necessary facilities for its con-

Secretary Anderson stated that, considering bids, the Navy would be governed not only by cost but also by the need for timely and satisfactory completion, geographic dispersal and other considerations of national welfare.

Any additional pilots who bring in MIGs from Communist territory in the Far East will be eligible for a \$50,000 reward under the same conditions but not during the truce period. riod. Funds for the rewards come from an AF "contingent fund."


Gen. Clark released the following statement in reference to the return of the MIG: "When the rightful ownership of the MIG that recently landed at Kimpo has been established, we will offer to turn it over to that owner." Since the original announcement of the offer, two MIGs have been flown from behind the Iron Curtain by Polish Air Force pilots who escaped to Denmark. However, those planes soon were returned to the Communists.

The 22-year-old flier, Lt. Noh Keun Suk, said he did not know of the reward offer and had made the dash to freedom because he was anti-Communist and had been reared as a Christian.

The surrendered MIG fighter flew across the southern boundary of the truce zone to Kimpo airfield, about 15 miles north-west of Seoul.

An AF official in Washington remarked that in any case the country had gotten its money's worth out of the Communist de-fection. The pilot will be offered asylum under the existing U.S. policy on political refugees.

Although every-thing was undoubtedly a per-petual malaise, nevertheless, the year after he left the NYU quad he displayed an ability of such estimable quality that he (a) posed in the nation's leading magazines to advertise Jockey underwear and (b) collected 21 victories.

Just what happened in succeeding years is difficult to surmise, but suffice it to say that Branca's winning percentage seem in danger of dropping below his batting average. There was only one trouble, Brooklyn was six games out of first place when the All-Star game was played and it appeared that the only thing that could halt the Phillies Curt Simmons was a power lawnmower. At this time Robin Roberts also of the

time Robin Roberts also of the Phillies owned something like 11 victories.
Following the All-Star game, the Dodgers depl yed for a lengthy series at home against the western hostiles. The Dodgers were trailing far behind in the ninth inning of the last game of the opening series so Shotton threw in Branca to see how far threw in Branca to see how far the Cub batters could hit the ball. No one is quite sure what Ralph threw that day including the Cubs. The hardest hit ball traveled 200 feet...100 up and 100 down into Billy Cox's glove, and not a Cub sniffed first base.

Two days later, he was thrown to the wolves in the seventh frame but faced only ten men in three innings. Shotton's brain

An executive order still in effect even though the Korean truce has been signed suspends the Table of Maximum Punishments as to certain offenses under the Uniform Code of Military Justice. Executive Order 10247 of 29 May, 1951 states in summary that punishments for violation of the following articles of UCMJ are not governed by the above table: Article 82- Solicitation Article 85- Desertion Article 86 (3)- Unathorized

Article 87- Missing Movement Article 90 - Assaulting or Willfully Disobeying an Officer Article 91 (1) Striking or assaulting a Warrant Officer or Petty Officer while such officer

retty Officer while such officer is in the execution of his duty. Article 92 (2) Willfully disobeying lawful order of those persons in Article 91 (1) above Article 113- Misbehavior of Sentinel or Lookout Article 115- Malingering The limitation placed on the application of this order is that the offense must be committed within an area under the command of or controlled by Commander-in-Chief, Far East.
