ANCHORAGE, ALASKA: Senator Ernest Gruening of Alaska said Saturday a Russian Engineer's proposal for a dam to be built across the Bering Strait in cooperation with the United States should be studied thoroughly.

"A joint commission, of experts in various fields, should take a close look at the proposal to see if it is feasible," Gruening said. The cost, estimated in a Moscow news dispatch at more than 17 billion dollars, might also be considered, Gruening added. "No commitments could be made pending such studies" he said.

DETROIT Oct.24 New car introductions used to come only once a year. But things are going to be different in 1960. Autumn introductions of 1960 model cars will be completed this week.

Chryslers new smaller "Valiant" which makes its debut thursday fills out the lineup and completes the first set of compact cars by the big three of the auto industry. But the second wave of compacts is not far behind. Indications now are that both Ford and General Motors will introduce some new models in the spring. The Mercury, Edsel, Lincoln divisions of Ford already has announced plans to buld a more luxurious smaller car called the Comet. It is now aimed for mid-April showing.

The Buick, Oldsmobile and Pontiac divisions of General Motors are well along on their plans for smaller models and could decide them soon afterwards.

This would mean four new cars in the market place before the time rolls around to bring out 1961 models. These incidentally, probably will be unveiled even earlier than this year since the National auto show will open in Detroit in October 1960 and the companier will want to display their cars in advance of this show if possible.

Both the Comet and the three top cars still officially unnamed will be compact cars but not too small. They will be lighter weight with new engineering features. They won't be as big as the standard 1960 models neither will they be as small as the Corvair, Falcon or Valiant.

The Comet will be marketed by Mercury Dealers and is understood to have considerable styling similarity to the 1960 Standard sized Mercurys. Interior dimensions will be much the same as the Falcon and a version of the Falcon Six Cylinder Engine will be used. For the Falcon this Engine is advertised as 90 Horsepower. Reports say it tests more than this and that the higher figure will be used for the Comet.

The rear end will be longer than the Falcon and trunk space is said to have been increased more than three cubic feet.

All in all it will look considerablydifferent from the Falcon will weigh a little more have more luxurious appointments inside and willcost a little more although probably not as much as the most expensive versions of the standard size Ford.

MENTAL ESCAPEES RECAPTURED

ATASCADERO, CALIFORNIA - - Two dangerously insane men among seven who sawed their way out of Atascadero State Mental Hospital were recaptured Satureday. Motorists were warned about the five still at large.

Friday night, the seven cut through a special type of steel bar which state officials had been told was saw-proof. Forty other patients in the same ward could have fled but did not.

In mid-morning Jesse Reyes, 23, walk up to a psychiatric technician near a school in Atascadero and pleaded "take me back to the hospital." The technician was out looking for the fugitives. Mason Alston 22 years of age, criminally insane was captured earlier nine miles north of the hospital by officers alerted by a passing motorist. Radio broadcasts warned motorists against giving rides to the escapees.

Two of the escapees are mental deficients. The five others were listed as dangerous. They have histories of burglaties and of being socially hostile.





WEST GERMAN REARMAMENT

LONDON: Differences are building up behind the scenes between allied military and political planners over West Germanys quickly rising arms industry.

A seemingly simple issue is at stake: should the Germans be allowed to make heavy ships, tanks, guns and missiles again? Deep emotional, political, economic and military overtones cloud the question.

Military leaders, including American General Lauris
Norstad, who is the supreme Allied Commander in
Europe, think "yes." Shrewd Diplomats, even those
in Bonn, say "No; at least not until the outcome of
the East-West summit talks become clear." So far the
political men are getting their way.

Action to enable West Germany to become a major weapons producer for the west has been suspended at least until next spring when the prospects for ending the East-West arms race should be better known. To understand the comples situation, a bit of history has to be read.

Right now, East Germany is barred by treaty from making a wide variety of offensive weapons. These bans were set in 1954 when the defeated German people became a sovereign nation and joined NATO, the 15-power Atlantic pact. The aim was to prevent the sort of runaway rearmament that led the Germans to start two World Wars. It was part of the price they had to pay their former enemies for political independence and the right to rearm even in a small way.

These restrictions were written into a seven-nation alliance known as the Western European Union. Aside from giving the Germans the right to rearm, the WEU treaty elso specified the sort of weapons which they could not make. On the banned list were A-B-C (Atomic-Biological-Chemical) weapons. The Germans have stuck to their bargain.

When they have wanted to produce arms on the banned list they have applied to Norstad for approval. If he has felt that it would be in the general allieds interest to approve the request he has written and said so to the WEU Council.

So far this has happened three times.

First an anti-tank rocket, then a big naval ship for training, and a few days ago, certain guided missiles were taken off of the banned list.

The business of having these curbs removed one by one is complicated. Each time it happens countroversies arise. Accusing communist fingers point back to Germany's old crimes.

GERMANY (CON'D)

Norstad advised the allies not long ago he dislikes this "piecemeal" approach to the problem. He promised that he would have more to say about it later.

The military situation in Europe is changing. New roles are being thought out for the West Germans as for other allied powers. And besides, the reviving arms industry in West Germany very soon indeed will carry the country to the extreme limits of its treaty restrictions.

Some examples of the ever-changing situation: NATO planners are reorganizing their Northern Naval Command which, among other things, guards the northern approaches to the Baltic.

They want West Germany to play a bigger role in Baltic defense. This they feel can be done with smaller ships like E-Boats, Mine-Sweepers, Torpedo-Boats; not necessarily capital ships. But under the WEU treaty West Germany is barred from building warships over 3,000 tons or submarines over 350 tons. Thus Norstad intends to argue that these levels must be raised.

Most of the fighting ships used by the Germans have come so far from Britain and America. The same is true of heavy tanks and guns. More and more military aircraft are being built in Germany under license. Arrangements are in hand with other countries for the joint design and production of tanks, armored troop carriers and rockets. Four Destroyers and several Motor Torpedo Boats are under constuction in German yards.

ON SALUTES

WASHINGTON: (NAVNEWS) -- Originally salutes were simply ways of admitting submission. Hats were doffed because the vanquished took off their helmits to the victors, people bowed because the conquered bowed their necks to the conquerors.

Salutes from guns were originally made to show that guns had been rendered harmless. The old sailing ships struck their topsails so that could not manuever to attack the saluted ship. Both these methods of saluting indicated friendly intentions.

The ordinary hand salute started with the conquered taking off their helmits to the victors. The old Navy salute was performed by lifting the cap from the head. This salute was used by the Royal Navy until approximately Queen Victoria's reign. It is said that she saw men standing in the rain with their caps off during a visit to one of her ships. She ordered that a touch of the visor was all that was necessary for a salute.

UNITED NATIONS -- Nine different countries had some representation on the first-rate music program given here Saturday in the U.N. Hall in celebration of United Nations Day.

Rio De Janeiro sent a conductor, Finland a Basso, Canada a contralto, Austria a Soprano, France a pianist, Central and South America some rousing compositions.

To make the event as widely international as possible, the broadcast program, plus pick ups from Moscow and Geneva, went directly to 17 countries and by recordings to 60 more.

The New York Philharmonic and the school Cantorum of about 100 voices were the main music-makers that packed the platform of this comed, circular hall.

Eleazar De Carvalho, from Brazil, conducted this orchestra for the first time, and proved to be a dynamic interperter of a series of unusually stormy works.

After a welcome by Dag Hammarskjold, Secretary-General of the United Nations, the program opened with Chaves's Sinfonia India, and continued with Frank's Symphonic variations, with Robert Casadeyus as soloist, and Villalobes, Descobrimento of Brasil. Then to prove Beethoven was as such of a thunderer as the South Americans, it ended with the finale of his 9th symphony.

Soloists were Elisabeth Schwarzkopf, Maurren Forrester, Jan Peerce and Kim Borg. All the voices but Borg's were known here, and known most favorably. The newcomer, though he sange passages too brief to allow any definitve judgment, sounded like a stunning basso, colored, rich, warm and resonant. He will make his Metropolitan Opera debut this week.

WASHINGTON - - Korean Ambassador Dr. You Chan Yang appealed Saturday to U.S. Christians to halt the return of Koreans in Japan to Communist North Korea.

He charged that Korean Nationals resident in Japan are being subjected coercion, intense propaganda and pressure to "volunteer" to go to North Korea. Japan is not permitting them to take their property, he said.

He said "I am confident that it goes against the grain of american Christians of all denominations that helpless human beings should be sent to godless, atheistic North Korea," in a statement.

The Ambassador said 600,000 Korean Nationls, now resident in Japan, are being deported to North Korea. Ninety percent of them originally came from south Korea, he said.

Japanese and International Red Cross officials, however, have reported that for the present less than 200 North Koreans living in Japan have signified they will return to North Korea next month.

BOULDGNE, FRANCE: A workman, Saturday, discovered what was reported to be an unpublished poem of the French author Victor Hugo that had remained hidden inside a statue of the Emperor Napoleon for 118 years. Workmen uncovered the poem, written on parchment and stuffed inside a lead pipe inside the statue, as they removed the statue from its pedestal overlooking the English Channel.

The statue, damaged during World War II, was removed to make way for another image of Napoleon which President De Gualle has ordered set on the spot. It stands on the place where Napoleons army is supposed to have left from for the invasion of England.

Literary historians theorized that the poem was to have been read at the dedication ceremonies of the statue in 1841 but that it was suppressed by the French government because of its violently anti-English tone. England and France at that time were just beginning to patch up their relationships after the Napoleonic Wars. The poem, addressed to Napoleon, reads:


Along the waters edge, within the gloomy Babylonian cities,


