

### KEARSARGE DICTATING ACCOUNT OF FLIGHT

KEARSARGE -- Astronaut Walter Schirra, who orbited the earth six times Wednesday, is traveling by sea today, aboard the aircraft carrier Kearsarge. He is headed for Honolulue

Schirra, who came down in his space capsule less than three miles off

the Kearsarge's bow is dictating an account of his flight.

Everything went smoothly Wednesday, as Schirra took the longest trip

yet made by an American in space.

Schirra is said to be feeling fine, and has been pronounced "healthy as a bear", following a complete physical examination. Schirra is due at Honolulu Saturday.

The Justice Department said that Meredith is going to stay at the University.

## TROPICAL STURM DAISY NOW FULL HURRICANE

MIAMI — Tropical storm Daisy developed overnight into a full hurricane with winds estimated at seventy five miles an hour near its center, and gales extending outward as far as 250 miles.

At last report the storm was moving West-Northwest at eight miles an hour. At 1000 GMT, Daisy was centered about 775 miles East of Miami, Florida. Weather Bureau experts predict some change in the force of the hurricane, but none in its size.

### U.S. CALLS ON FRIENDLY NATIONS TO CURB SHIPPING TO CUBA

LONDON -- It is reported that the United States has called on seven friendly nations (European), including Britain, to impose tighter curbs on their shipping with Cuba.

In addition to Britain, the nations approached are West Germany, Italy, Greece, Norway, Denmark and Sweden. All but Sweden are NATO allies.

## ARMS IN CUBA THREAT TO SECURITY

WASHINGTON — Unanimous agreement has been reached among the Foreign Ministers of the United States and nineteen Latin American nations that the Soviet arms buildup in Cuba threatens Western Hemisphere security.

A joint statement was issued Wednesday following two days of consultation in Washington. It showed agreement also that special measures are needed, both individual and collective, to meet the growing danger of Cuba's transformation into, "an armed base for communist penetration of the America's."

### DEBATES RESUMED IN U.N.

UNITED NATIONS — The United Nations General Assembly resumes its general debate today. On Wednesday, two familiar issues were aired in the assembly as Rominia carried on the Soviet bloo's bid to win recognition of two Germanys', and Pakistan charged India with invading two points along the east Pakistani border last week. The Security Council meets today to recommend Algeria's admission to the world body.

### MEETINGS IN THE WHITE HOUSE

WASHINGTON — President Kennedy meets today at the White House with West Berlin's Mayor Willy Brandt. Later the President has an engagement with Crown Prince Faisal of Saudi Arabia.

# KENNEDY HAS GO-AHEAD ON TARIF-CUT PROVISION

WASHINGTON — Congress plans to hand President Kennedy the unprecedented tariff-cutting powers he requested. Both House and Senate hope to clear the trade expansion measure today. In addition to the tariff cutting provision, the bill also would set up new aid programs for workers and businesses hurt by Foreign competition.

# WIRTZ MEETS WITH AEROJET TO AVERT WALKOUT THREAT

WASHINGTON -- Labor Secretary Willard Wirtz is meeting today with officials of the Aerojet Corporation and the striking Machinists Union.

Wirtz hopes to avert a walkout, which he has described as, "an intolerable threat to the nations defense."

### DE GAULLE THREATENS TO QUIT

LONDON — French President Charles DeGaulle has threatened to quit today, unless France approves his proposal to elect further Presidents by popular vote. The proposal will be submitted to a national referendum on October 28.

### EDWARD R. MUROW SUFFERS PNEUMONIA

TEHRAN, IMAN — Edward R. Murow, news announcer across the nation and around the world, Director of the U.S. Information Agency, is suffering from Pneumonia, according to the U.S. Army Hospital here. Murrow, who is on a tour of the near and Middle East, became ill last week. He is confined to the hospital at Tehran.

# PERSON TO PERSON

... A cold forced President Kennedy to cancel all his appointments yesterday but he went ahead with plans for a political speaking trip this weekend in Michigan, Kentucky, Ohio and Mirnesota, and spent part of the time in bed reading documents and conducted some business by telephone... Russian Ambassador Platon D. Morozov surprised everyone Wednesday night by showing up at a reception. celebrating the 14th anniversary of South Korea's Independence at United Nations ... Attorney William Rollo, 72, former father-in-law of Actor David Niven, was killed Wednesday when he fell from a horse during a fox hunt and broke his neck in England, .. Actress Elsa Lancheste says her husband Charles Laughton is aware he is suffering from cancer, but remains cheerful despite the seriousness of his illness... Australian actress Diane Cilento, 26, has been awarded a divorce in London on the grounds of desertion by her Ítalian husband, Andre Volpe...former President Dwight D, Fisenhower was the guest of honor Wednesday night at a fund-raising show featuring sters from the world of entertainment... Mrs. Eleanor Roosevelt, 77, will be forced to remain longer in Columbia-Presbyterian Medical Center in New York City because of an "infectious condition." ... Mignel Fitzgerald, 36, Wichita, former pilot for an Argentine Airlines, has announced plans for an attempt to set a new world's record for non-stop flight in a single engine plane weighing less than 6,000 pounds...Milton Carr, United Press International Business Representative, has been named Peace Corps Representative in Ecuador.

### AKOUND THE WOKLD

...French President Charles DeGaulle, faced with a parliamentary revolt that appeared likely to overthrow Premier George's pompidou, threatened to resign if his proposed constitution change is defeated. De Gaulle insists that his successors be elected by a direct vote of the people so they will be strong enough to lead the Government.

...President Adolfo Lopez Mateos of Mexico said that no Latin American nation is "obligated" to aid the United States in enforcing the Monroe Doctrine and

that he does not consider Cuba to be a threat to hemisphere peace.

... The Soviet Union played down the space flight of Astronaut Walter Schirra and played up the fifth anniversary of its pioneer Sputnak I which launched the space age on October 4, 1957.

...East German communist police shot high pressure spurts of water at newsmen in West Berlin watching them sealing up a refugee tunnel under the city wall. The tunnel was one of many dug to enable refugees to avoid communist gunfire

in their escapes to the West.

... The Soviet Union told the West "not to expect anything new" from the communis

side in negotiations on a nuclear test ban treaty.

...Peanuts and pay raises slowed Congress' drive for adjournment but leaders still hoped to wind up the first Kennedy Congress by Saturday night, Despite the last-minute hurdles, congressional leaders said they still saw no reason why the 87th Congress could not be finally adjourned by Saturday Wight, They originally had hoped to quit for the year late tonight.

... The Senate cleared the way for final congressional action on a Bill coupling a pay raise for Federal workers with a 602 million increase in Postal rates. The Bill calling for a five-cent postage stamp for first class letters on

January 7, was sent to the House for Final approval.
